Last year was a challenging season for 'The Kid', as they stumbled to a disappointing 4-10 record. Despite having historically been a middling team with a 23-19 record over the past few seasons, last year's performance marked a significant decline from mediocrity to outright struggle. The team was unable to find consistency, often falling short in pivotal matchups, which left them languishing at the bottom of the standings.

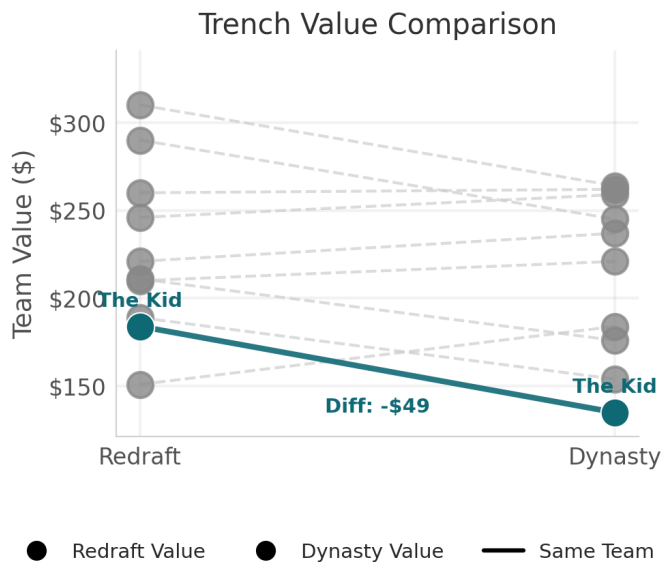
Though Derrick Henry and Josh Jacobs delivered elite performances, finishing as RB2 and RB5

respectively, and James Conner provided solid support as RB10, their contributions were not enough to lift 'The Kid' out of its rut. Henry's impressive 1921 rushing yards and Jacobs' 1329 rushing yards underscored their value, yet the rest of the roster failed to mirror their success on the field.

Injuries further compounded the team's woes, with Tee Higgins struggling with an ankle sprain and knee issues, and Rashid Shaheed being hampered by a meniscus injury. Higgins, despite his ailments, managed 911 receiving yards and 10 touchdowns,

but his limited availability was a blow to the team's offensive cohesion. Similarly, Shaheed's truncated season, with only 6 games played, left a gap that was difficult to fill.

Travis Kelce, though a reliable presence, didn't deliver his usual high output with 823 receiving yards and 3 touchdowns, failing to provide the spark needed for a turnaround. Overall, last season was a sobering reminder of how crucial depth and health are for success in fantasy football, leaving 'The Kid' to reflect on its shortcomings as it plots a path forward.



Unfortunately for 'The Kid', the long-term outlook for their roster is bleak. The team is hemorrhaging value, losing \$49 in dynasty worth as several key players are trending downward. The aging core of the roster, particularly Derrick Henry, who sees his status plummet from RB4 to RB17, reflects a concerning dip in performance and value, dropping from \$41 to \$21. This decline suggests that Henry's days as a dominant force may be numbered, posing a significant challenge for the team's future competitiveness.

Adding to the woes, the roster lacks youthful depth with rising potential. While Patrick Mahomes and Jordan Love provide some glimmer of optimism, gaining in value slightly, it is not enough to offset the widespread depreciation occurring elsewhere on the team. Travis Kelce's drop from TE10 to TE13, combined with a valuation decrease from \$8 to \$3, exemplifies the issues faced with an aging

squad, further compounded by James Conner's and Josh Jacobs's substantial declines.

The wide receiver corps also faces turmoil, with Rashid Shaheed and Keon Coleman slipping in rankings and value. Tee Higgins, while maintaining some security as WR15, experiences a slight drop in perceived worth, from \$35 to \$33. These regressions across critical positions reflect an urgent need for strategic overhaul and inject new, promising talents to rejuvenate the roster.

With the current talent pool dwindling in effectiveness and value, the team's ability to compete in future seasons appears grim. Without a significant infusion of new talent through wise drafting or savvy trades, 'The Kid' risks further decline, trapped in a cycle of mediocrity that could become increasingly difficult to escape.

As the upcoming season commences, 'The Kid' faces an uphill battle in a league teeming with competition, reflecting a projected redraft value of #9 out of 10. The starting lineup offers a glimmer of hope at a slightly better #8 ranking, yet this is cold comfort in a league where only the strongest teams thrive. The outlook suggests a season riddled with struggles and challenges, as the team's depth and star power fall short of their peers.

Quarterback play is a significant concern for 'The Kid,' with Patrick Mahomes ranked QB7 and Jordan Love at QB15. While Mahomes remains a solid option in his prime years, relying on him alone to carry the team through the season presents a risky gamble. Without a stable backup or an emerging talent to support him, the QB position seems poised to underwhelm this year.

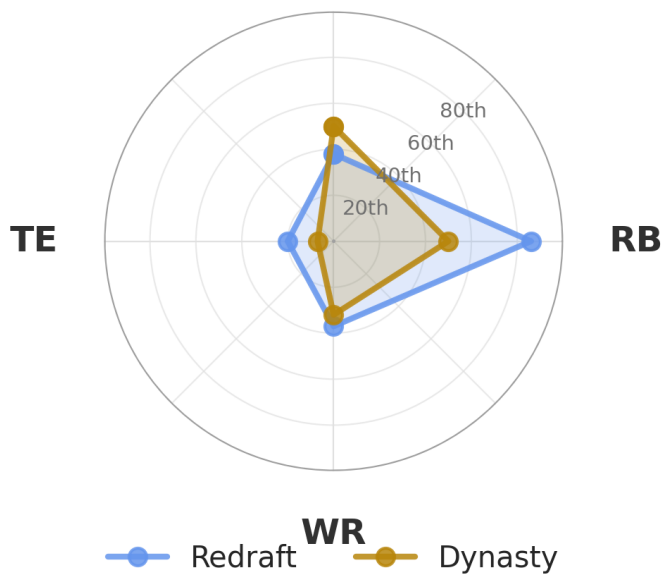
Running backs present the only bright spot with Derrick Henry and Josh Jacobs leading the charge, ranked RB4 and RB7 respectively. Despite their promising rankings, the supporting cast, including James Conner and Roschon Johnson, lacks the depth needed to withstand injuries or bye weeks. With Dameon Pierce further down the list, any hope of consistency and dominance from this unit rests heavily on Henry and Jacobs staying healthy and productive.

The wide receivers, however, paint a bleaker picture, holding the dubious honor of being ranked

last among their peers. Tee Higgins and George Pickens offer some promise at WR14 and WR33, but the drop-off in talent is steep and concerning. The likes of Jayden Reed and Rashid Shaheed will need to exceed expectations for 'The Kid' to avoid being dwarfed by stronger receiving corps across the league.

Position Analysis

QB



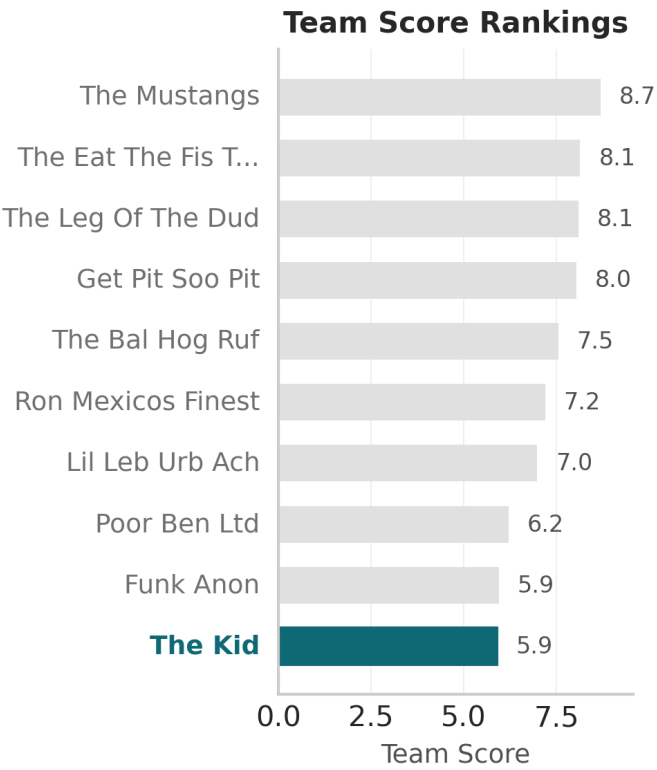
Despite some potential bright spots, the quarterback position remains a significant concern for 'The Kid' team. Patrick Mahomes may have moments of brilliance, but his potential inconsistency and lack of support from other quarterbacks like Jordan Love place this team in a precarious position. A ranking of 9th in this key role underscores the struggle to find stability and reliability, with Love needing to step up significantly to provide any real hope.

Wide receiver is another glaring weakness that cannot be overlooked. With Tee Higgins leading the charge, his ranking as WR14 provides a glimmer of hope, but the supporting cast leaves much to be desired. George Pickens and Jayden Reed show some promise, yet their rankings of WR33 and WR38, respectively, reflect a lack of depth and star power. Rashid Shaheed and Keon Coleman, ranked WR47 and WR48, will need to exceed expectations to elevate the team's prospects.

Further compounding the issue is the lack of reliable bench options. Players like Romeo Doubs, Diontae Johnson, and Marquez Valdes-Scantling are far from reassuring, with rankings deep in the list at WR61, WR95, and WR125, respectively. This lack of depth and high-ranking talent at wide receiver means 'The Kid' must rely heavily on favorable matchups or unexpected breakout performances to avoid languishing at the bottom of the standings.


Caught in a cycle of challenges, The Kid's rookie draft presents a sliver of hope amidst their ongoing struggles. With the second overall pick, they have an opportunity to fill vital gaps, particularly at wide receiver, where Tetairoa McMillan and Emeka Egbuka stand out as potential selections. The decision will weigh heavily on whether they prioritize aligning with consensus ADP or take a calculated risk on a player like Egbuka, who could offer a slight edge if he exceeds his projected draft spot. This critical choice could shape their chances of salvaging some competitive spirit in a season that already looks bleak.

Further down the line, The Kid holds the 2.05 pick, where anticipation is met with a sense of desperation to address multiple positional needs. Ideally, a player like Tre Harris or Colston Loveland would slide into this spot, providing a much-needed boost at WR or TE, respectively. However, given the long odds, they might settle for Jayden Higgins, who aligns well with ADP, or gamble on Shedeur Sanders in hopes he can stabilize their shaky QB situation. It's a daunting task to cover so many holes, but the draft capital they possess, however limited, will need to be leveraged wisely if there is any hope of improving their dismal outlook.




Despite a tumultuous previous season marked by a 4-10 record and limited success due to injuries and performance inconsistencies, 'The Kid' enters the upcoming season with significant challenges. The longstanding concerns surrounding the aging roster and their depreciating dynasty value underscore the pressing need for new talent, particularly at quarterback and wide receiver. While the running back position remains strong, the team's chances hinge on improving these weak spots and finding consistent performers. The recent rookie draft brings some optimism, but the overall outlook remains precarious, positioning 'The Kid' as one of the league's least competitive franchises heading into the season.

As we look ahead to this season, 'Funkaholics Anonymous' seems to be in for a challenging year. Despite a respectable third-place ranking in the quarterback position with Lamar Jackson leading the charge, the team's overall outlook remains dim. Jackson is expected to perform as QB2, providing the squad with one of its few strong points. However, this singular strength may not be enough to carry the team through the storms ahead.

Running back depth offers some glimmers of hope, yet the stability is questionable. Christian

McCaffrey stands at RB10, bolstered by Joe Mixon at RB15, which could balance the scales somewhat. as WR15 and WR18 respectively, the depth behind them lacks punch. Players like Jauan Jennings, Jakobi Meyers, and Cooper Kupp will need to outperform expectations to fill the void, which remains a tall order. This lack of reliable depth could prove to be a critical vulnerability over the grueling season.

On the brighter side, the tight end group presents a moderate strength with T.J. Hockenson standing firm as TE5. Yet, behind him, Jake Ferguson and Pat Freiermuth offer only moderate depth. While having Hockenson provides a semblance of stability, the overall impact from this position may still fall short of pushing 'Funkaholics Anonymous' into the upper echelons. This team faces an uphill battle, seeking to find balance amidst its glaring positional disparities.

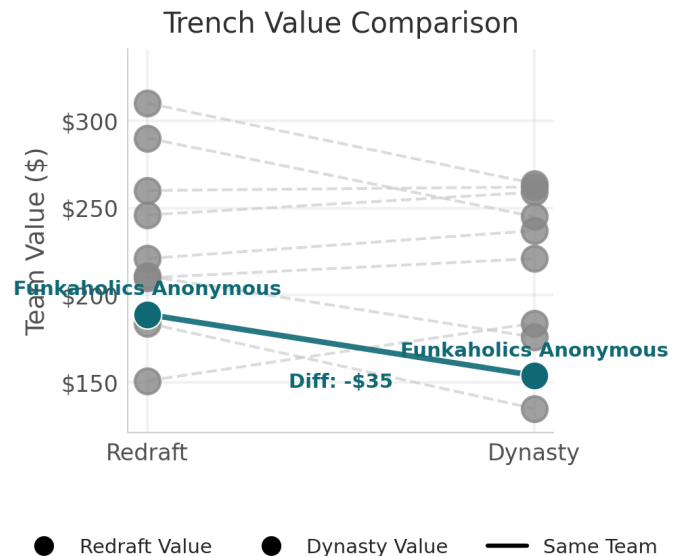

Last season, 'Funkaholics Anonymous' showcased their enduring strength with a commendable 9-5 record, maintaining their reputation as one of the league's elite teams. Despite this regular-season success, the team fell short in the postseason, unable to capitalize on their solid performances and continue their winning narrative into the playoffs.

A significant part of last year's competence stemmed from Lamar Jackson's stellar performance at QB1, delivering impressive passing and rushing yards that kept the team competitive. As they approach the twilight years of their careers, their diminishing auction values reveal the challenge of relying on aging stars who may not sustain their performance levels. This leaves 'Funkaholics Anonymous' in a precarious position, with limited options to fill the gaps once these key players phase out.

While Garrett Wilson offers a glimmer of hope with his rising value and promising future as a wide receiver, his presence alone is insufficient to stabilize the long-term outlook of the roster. The team needs to make strategic moves, possibly by acquiring young talent through trades or focusing on future draft prospects, to revitalize the roster and improve its dynasty positioning. Without decisive action, the team's long-term sustainability remains in jeopardy.

As Funkaholics Anonymous enters the rookie draft with high hopes of revitalizing their roster, they find themselves armed with a crucial asset: the 1.06 pick in the first round. This selection offers them a glimmer of hope amidst their aging lineup. The team's focus will undoubtedly be on strengthening their core, particularly at the running back and wide receiver positions. With some luck, top-tier talents like Emeka Egbuka or TreVeyon Henderson might miraculously slide to them, providing much-needed value and upside in their areas of weakness. However, the more likely scenario involves considering players like Luther Burden, Quinshon Judkins, or Matthew Golden,

who, while not as highly touted, could still address their glaring needs.

The rookie draft presents an opportunity for Funkaholics Anonymous to inject new life into their faltering team, but the pressure is palpable. Without an abundance of draft capital beyond their first-round pick, they must make this selection count. Securing a player who can contribute immediately and has long-term potential is imperative for shifting the narrative of their bleak future. With careful evaluation and perhaps a stroke of fortune, Funkaholics Anonymous might just find the pivotal piece they desperately need.

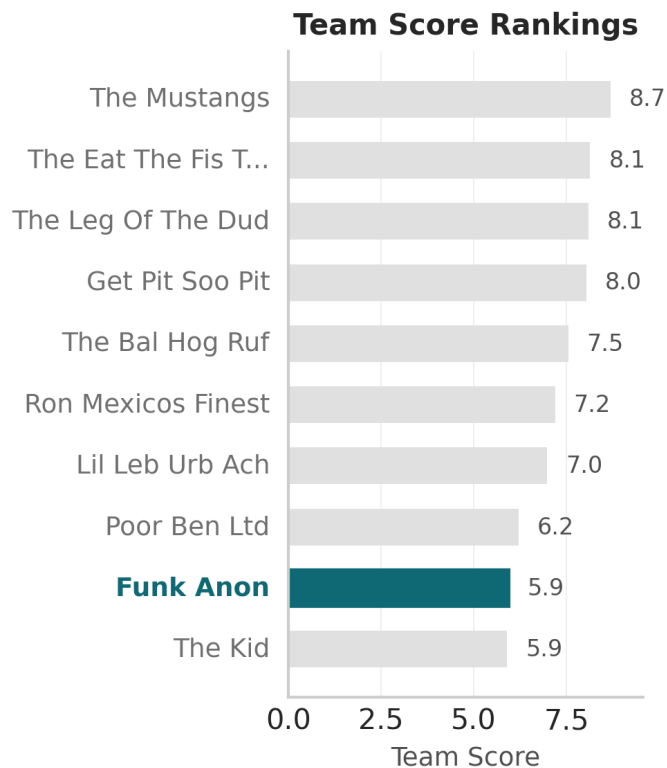
Jauan Jennings stands as a crucial figure for Funkaholics Anonymous, representing both hope and the team's current struggles. Last season, Jennings showed flashes of brilliance with the San Francisco offense, racking up 975 receiving yards and six touchdowns over 15 games. His consistent targeting, with 113 passes thrown his way, reflects his integral role in the lineup. Despite these respectable numbers, Jennings managed only a WR27 ranking, showcasing the discrepancy between his workload and fantasy impact.

As his age approaches 29 by the 2025 season, there are concerns about his ability to maintain or improve upon his past performance. Slated as the WR41 for the coming year, Jennings faces an uphill battle to outperform expectations. His average of 9 fantasy points per game last season places him as a stable but not standout option. For Funkaholics Anonymous, whose roster lacks the firepower of top-tier teams, Jennings' contributions could be pivotal, albeit with the understanding that he is more of a reliable role player than a game-changer.

The Poor Ben Ltd team has been stuck in a perpetual state of mediocrity, as evidenced by their 19-23 record over recent seasons. Last year was no different, with the team finishing once again in the middle of the pack, unable to break free from the chains of average performance. Despite having talented players, they found themselves unable to consistently translate potential into victories.

Bo Nix and Josh Allen both showcased moments of brilliance under center, throwing for 3,775 and

3,731 yards respectively. However, the team's inability to capitalize on these performances left fans yearning for more. Allen's impressive 12 rushing touchdowns added a dynamic edge, but it wasn't enough to lift the team beyond mediocrity.

In the receiving corps, Ladd McConkey emerged as a reliable target, racking up 1,149 receiving yards and 7 touchdowns. Trey McBride also contributed significantly with 1,146 receiving yards, yet only managed to find the end zone twice. Meanwhile, Mark Andrews' season was marred by limited

opportunities, resulting in a modest 673 receiving yards, albeit with an impressive 11 touchdowns.

Overall, last year's results epitomized the struggles of a team trapped in the clutches of mediocrity, with individual talent shining through but failing to align into a cohesive force capable of achieving greatness.

Meanwhile, Travis Etienne's subtle improvement from RB38 to RB35 adds another layer of depth to the backfield, suggesting a collective evolution that might just herald a new era for Poor Ben Ltd.

Yet, the winds of change also carry whispers of decline. The once-reliable Mark Andrews, slipping from TE6 to TE9, serves as a sobering reminder of the inevitable march of time. His slight depreciation in value underscores the fragility of longevity in this gladiatorial sport. On a similar note, Xavier Worthy's dip from WR25 to WR27 reflects a pause in his previously meteoric rise, raising questions about his ability to maintain his standing amidst a competitive field of young wideouts.

At the helm of the offense, the enigmatic Bo Nix has seen his quarterback rank drift from QB8 to QB10, sparking debates over his future as a fantasy leader. His drop in auction value suggests

that the faith once bestowed upon him might be wavering, yet he remains a pivotal piece in determining if Poor Ben Ltd can ascend beyond their middling status. Tyjae Spears' gentle decline from RB40 to RB42 further highlights the precarious nature of dynasty values, serving as a cautionary tale of potential unrealized.

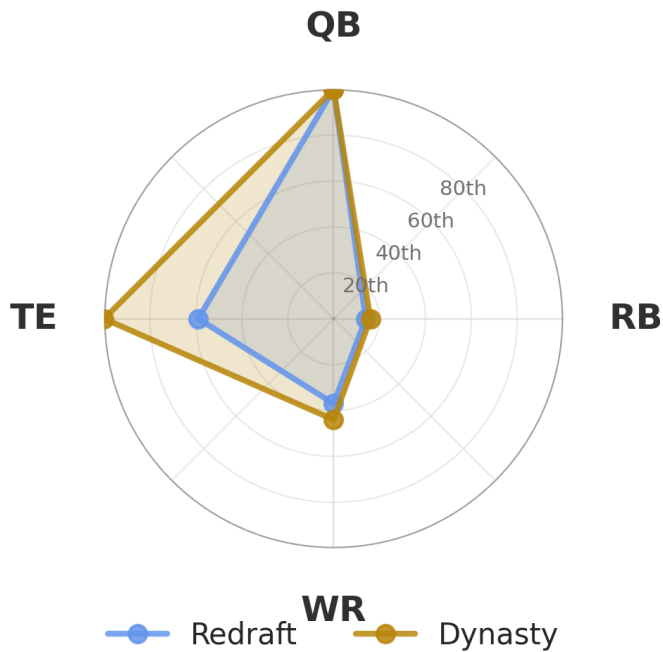

Position Analysis



The running back situation for 'Poor Ben Ltd' is nothing short of a catastrophe. With Travis Etienne leading the charge, albeit ranked only at RB38, the depth chart is a veritable wasteland. Tyjae Spears and Rachaad White, both ranked in the low forties, offer little hope of carrying the load. Javonte Williams might have once promised greatness, but ranking at RB42, he now finds himself mired in mediocrity. The presence of Trey Benson and Blake Corum, who round out the group, only accentuates the desolation that is the team's backfield, leaving this position a glaring vulnerability that could very well spell doom for their championship aspirations.

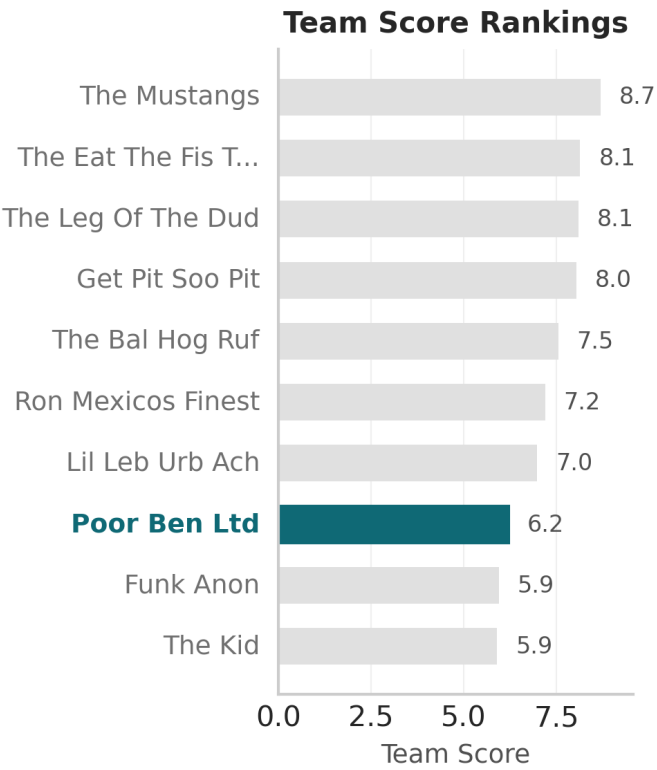
If the running back situation is bleak, the wide receiver corps is a haunting echo of that despair. Ranking at an unforgiving 9th at the position, Poor Ben Ltd's receivers are a motley crew that lacks consistency and star power. Ladd McConkey stands as the solitary beacon with a respectable WR11 ranking, but the drop-off thereafter is precipitous. Xavier Worthy and Rome Odunze hover in the mid-range, suggesting potential but lacking proven track records. Beyond them, names like Amari Cooper and Christian Watson languish at the bottom of the rankings, hinting at past glory but offering little in terms of future promise. This group, unless it can pull off multiple breakout

performances, risks being the Achilles' heel of the team.

With running backs and receivers both presenting such ominous challenges, Poor Ben Ltd faces an uphill battle this season. These weak spots in their roster threaten to undermine any potential victories, no matter how strong their quarterback and tight end positions might be. The specter of defeat looms large unless drastic improvements or strategic trades can alter their fortunes, casting a shadow over what promises to be a tumultuous season.

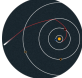
With the rookie draft looming, Poor Ben Ltd finds itself in a precarious position, holding four pivotal picks across the first two rounds. At 1.04, the team must decide whether to hope for a miracle fall of Tetairoa McMillan or Omarion Hampton, both slightly out of reach but much needed, or to go with a more predictable option in Emeka Egbuka to fill the glaring hole at wide receiver. Alternatively, selecting TreVeyon Henderson or Luther Burden might align the team's needs with value available at that spot, though each choice carries its own risks and speculations.

As the second round approaches, selections at 2.04, 2.06, and 2.09 will require Poor Ben Ltd to walk a tightrope between value and necessity. Tre Harris presents an enticing yet unlikely possibility at 2.04, while Jayden Higgins and Jaylin Noel hover as viable options to reinforce the wide receiver corps. Later, Cam Skattebo appears to be a logical fit for their running back woes if available, while Elic Ayomanor and Devin Neal remain intriguing alternatives depending on how the draft unfolds. This team holds the current-year draft capital necessary to address their weaknesses, but they will need a deft touch to capitalize on it.




Poor Ben Ltd finds itself in a challenging position ahead of the new season, struggling to escape its historical mediocrity. Despite possessing a top-tier quarterback and a reliable tight end group, the team's outlook is compromised by glaring weaknesses at the running back and wide receiver spots. The upcoming rookie draft is crucial, offering a chance to address these deficits and pivot from their current trajectory. With incremental and uncertain long-term gains, Poor Ben Ltd must act decisively to improve their standing in the league and avoid remaining near the bottom in rankings.

depth pieces, these picks offer a much-needed opportunity for rejuvenation.

While the immediate abundance of picks provides a hopeful glimpse into what could be a transformative draft, it's crucial to consider the long-term implications. Beyond the current year's array of selections, their future draft capital seems less promising, with only a single first-round pick secured for each of the 2026 and 2027 drafts. This suggests a window of opportunity that might not extend far into the future, placing pressure on the team to maximize this year's bounty.

Ultimately, this stockpile of draft assets presents both an opportunity and a challenge. The Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers must navigate the delicate balance of bolstering their roster with immediate talent while planning for sustainable success in subsequent seasons. It's a pivotal moment that could define their trajectory in the league, and their ability to capitalize on these picks will be critical to overcoming their current rank.

Despite holding significant draft capital, last year was a troubling campaign for the Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers as they finished with a disappointing 3-11 record. Historically, this team has been average, but recent seasons have seen them fall on hard times, underscored by a cumulative 16-26 record over the past three years. Last year, in particular, was a bitter reminder of

their struggles, despite boasting some impressive individual performances.

The team did receive elite showings from Terry McLaurin, who finished as WR5, and Brock Bowers, who ended the season as TE2. Additionally, solid contributions came from Davante Adams, despite his injury setbacks, and Courtland Sutton, finishing as WR12 and WR10 respectively. These performances, however, were overshadowed by the team's overall lack of success.

Injuries played a significant role in derailing the team's aspirations. Davante Adams battled hamstring and knee issues throughout the season, yet still managed to produce 85 receptions for 1063 yards and 8 touchdowns. Ricky Pearsall's season was notably impacted by a serious gunshot injury, limiting him to just 11 games, where he posted 31 receptions for 400 yards and 3 touchdowns. These health setbacks were critical in undermining the team's potential to overcome their challenging season.

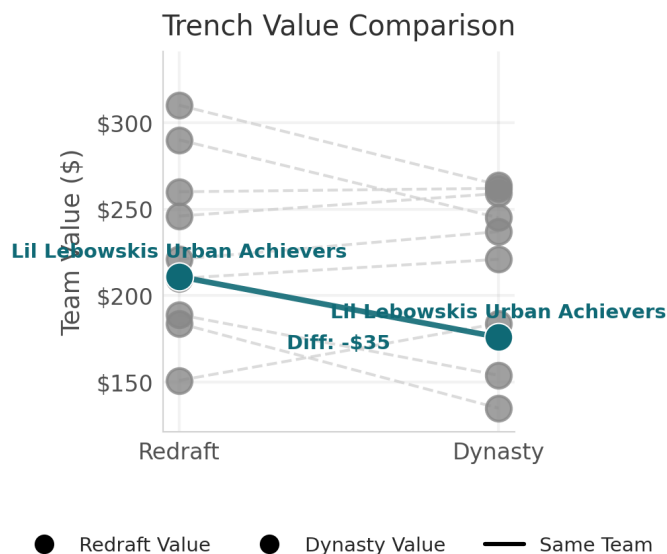
Despite last year's hardships, the Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers enter the upcoming season with a middling outlook, poised to finish somewhere in the middle of the pack. While their depth is notable, particularly at the wide receiver position, their starting lineup lacks the star power necessary to propel them into serious playoff contention. The team ranks 6th overall in redraft value, with their starting lineup even further behind at 7th, suggesting that their ceiling might not be high enough to make a deep postseason run.

At quarterback, the team is notably weak, with Justin Herbert leading a group that ranks last in the league. Despite Herbert's potential, his projected QB11 ranking doesn't provide the elite-level performance needed to compensate for the inconsistencies and lower projections of Drake Maye, Trevor Lawrence, and Geno Smith. This lack of a top-tier quarterback could be detrimental when facing opponents with stronger options under center.

The running back situation is hardly any better, as the team finds itself ranked 9th in this category. With Bucky Irving as the only starter projected within the top ten of RBs, there's a significant drop-

off after him. Rhamondre Stevenson, who is expected to be a starter, is an uncertain RB35 and could be a critical factor in this team's success or failure. If he fails to exceed expectations, the Lil Lebowskis may struggle to generate the necessary points from their backfield.

In contrast, the wide receiver and tight end positions offer a glimmer of hope. Ranked in the upper half of the league, their receiving corps is bolstered by the consistent Davante Adams and promising talents like Zay Flowers and DK Metcalf. More importantly, Brock Bowers provides a standout presence at tight end, which ranks at the top among league competitors. However, even these strengths may not be enough to fully compensate for deficiencies in other areas.



The long-term outlook for the Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers reveals potential struggles in maintaining a competitive edge. Declining dynasty values are evident, with the team hemorrhaging \$35 in value, reflecting a concerning trend. Notable players like Courtland Sutton and Davante Adams are seeing significant drops in their projected positional rankings and corresponding auction values, which could leave a gap in the wide receiver core. Similarly, Calvin Ridley and Rico Dowdle are also losing value, signaling potential weaknesses that may need addressing in future drafts or trades.

While there are some bright spots with players gaining dynasty value, such as Drake Maye and Justin Herbert improving their rankings, these

increases aren't enough to offset the overall decline. The team does benefit from Bucky Irving moving up in the running back ranks, but maintaining a strong roster will still require strategic decisions. The current trend suggests an uphill battle in remaining competitive in the long run unless significant changes are made.

The team's reliance on aging players is another concern, particularly with key contributors like Sutton, Adams, and Ridley all trending downward as they hit the latter stages of their careers. This could lead to inconsistencies and a lack of depth in crucial positions if young talent isn't brought in to fill the void. The need to balance experience with emerging talent will be critical to avoid a sharp decline in performance.

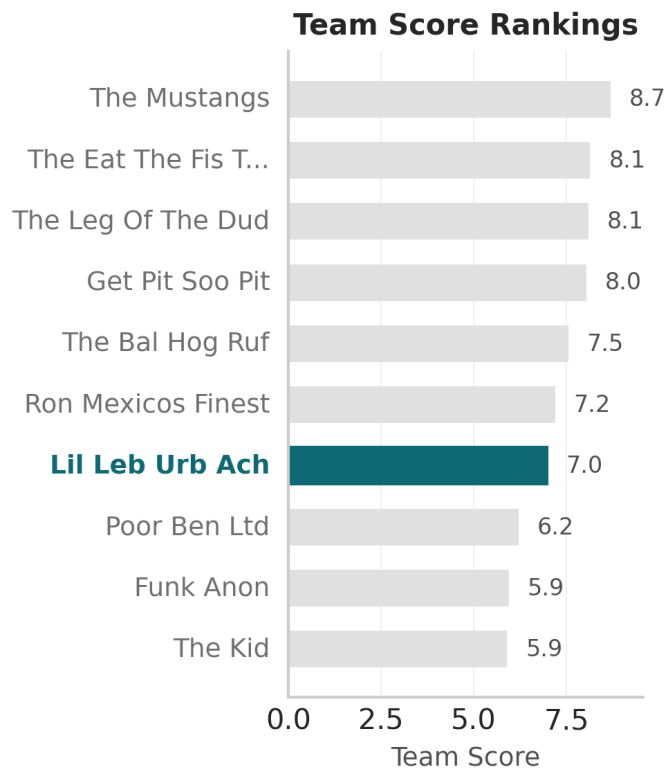
Ultimately, the Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers face an uncertain future in their dynasty league standing, currently ranked eighth. Without bolstering their lineup with younger, high-potential players, they risk sliding further down the ranks, especially as other teams strengthen their rosters. The focus should be on shrewd draft picks and trades to secure rising stars and offset the declining contributions of older players.

With picks 1.01, 1.09, 2.01, and 2.08, the Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers have a chance to inject some much-needed talent into their roster through the rookie draft. The first overall pick is a golden opportunity, with Ashton Jeanty standing out as the current ADP leader, perfectly aligning with the team's need at running back. However, if the Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers have a strong belief in Omarion Hampton's potential, he could be a less conventional yet worthy choice. With the 1.09 pick, while an ideal scenario would see Quinshon Judkins slip through, the team might have to settle for someone like Kaleb Johnson or Cam Ward if they wish to address their glaring needs at RB or QB.

Moving to the second round, the team holds picks 2.01 and 2.08—critical slots in solidifying their future roster. At 2.01, Kaleb Johnson remains a fit to strengthen the running back position, though Cam Ward or Shedeur Sanders could bring some much-needed depth under center. As they reach 2.08, the Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers will hope

for a lucky break with Shedeur Sanders perhaps falling into their lap, giving them a viable option at quarterback. Alternatively, Cam Skattebo or Devin Neal could be considered if the emphasis remains on boosting the running back corps. Despite these potential grabs, the team's overall draft strategy will need to be sharp to navigate both immediate needs and long-term concerns effectively.

With a middle-of-the-pack ranking, the Lil Lebowskis Urban Achievers enter the new season facing a blend of potential and uncertainty. Their significant draft capital offers a chance to reshape their roster, particularly addressing weaknesses in the quarterback and running back positions while capitalizing on a talented group of wide receivers and an elite tight end. However, the memories of last year's disappointing 3-11 finish linger, fueled by underperformance and injuries. The team must navigate these challenges alongside a daunting long-term roster outlook marked by declining dynasty values. Successfully leveraging their rookie draft picks will be pivotal in reversing their fortunes and enhancing their future prospects.

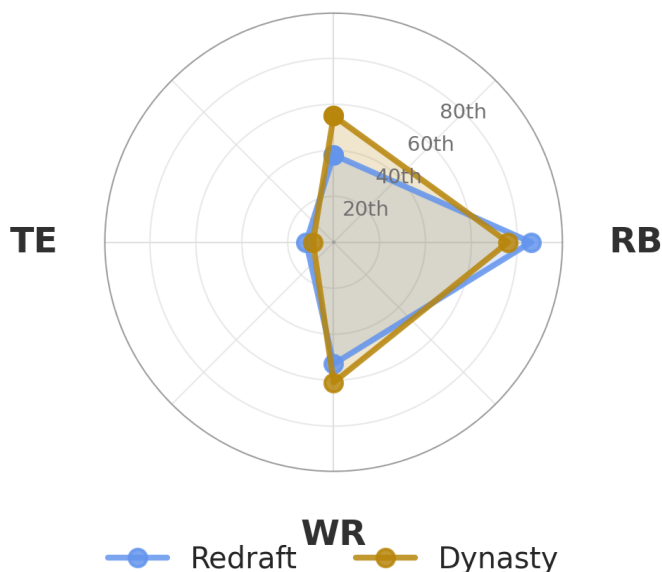

In the second round, Ron Mexico's quest becomes more like a chaotic game of fantasy Jenga. With the 2.03 selection, they peer into the swirling

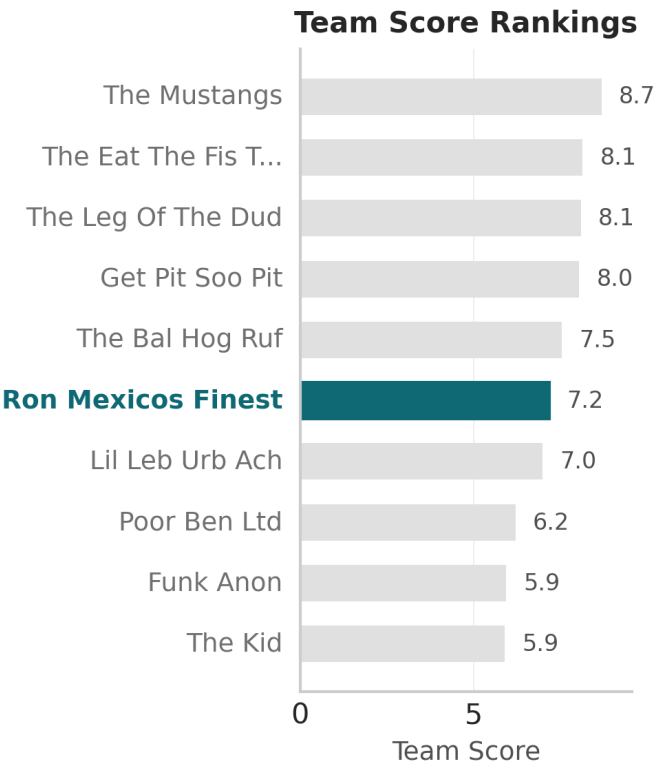

Similarly, Drake London steps up as a top-10 wide receiver, providing a reliable target who continues to ascend in both performance and value.

The team's wide receiver corps also benefits from potential breakout performances by Josh Downs

and Michael Pittman. Both are young receivers on upward trajectories, each moving up several spots in the rankings. Their growth promises to add depth and versatility to the lineup, offering additional options for quarterback connections and increasing the team's scoring potential.

However, not all is optimistic as the team faces challenges with some players losing value. Veterans like Darnell Mooney and Dallas Goedert see their rankings and values decline, and the team will need to address these gaps either through trade or strategic drafting. While the Ruffians have managed to hold their position in the league, the balance between maintaining current assets and infusing new talent will be crucial to advancing beyond their current mid-tier status.

Similarly, Jaxon Smith-Njigba's rise from WR16 to WR12, boosting his value from \$29 to an impressive \$40, indicates his growing influence as a reliable wide receiver.

Malik Nabers further highlights the team's robust foundation, ascending from WR8 to WR4, which reflects a remarkable increase in projected impact and value, climbing from \$42 to \$53. Alongside Nabers, Khalil Shakir's steady progress from WR44 to WR41 shows subtle but essential growth, echoing the team's depth at the wide receiver position.

Despite some loss in dynasty value from seasoned players like Chris Godwin, Jonnu Smith, and Jared Goff, whose values are slightly declining, the overall composition of the team remains strong. The balance between emerging players on the rise and veterans who provide stability ensures that 'They're Eating The Fish, They're Eating The Bats' maintains a competitive edge now and in the future.

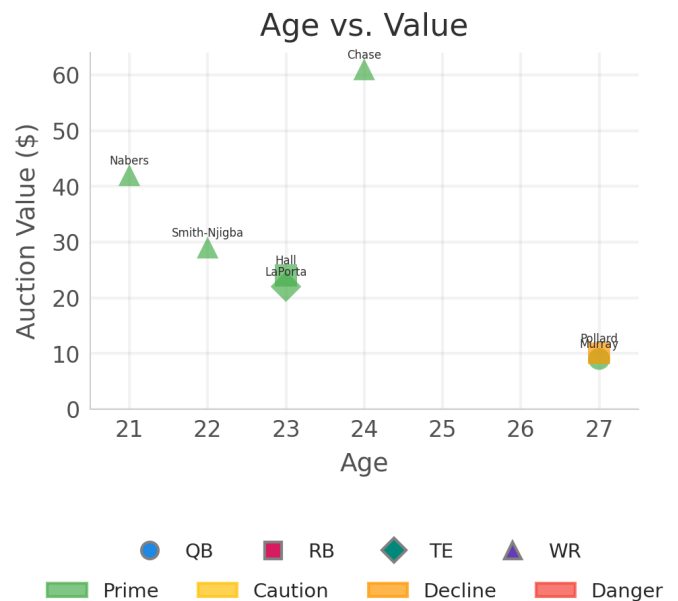

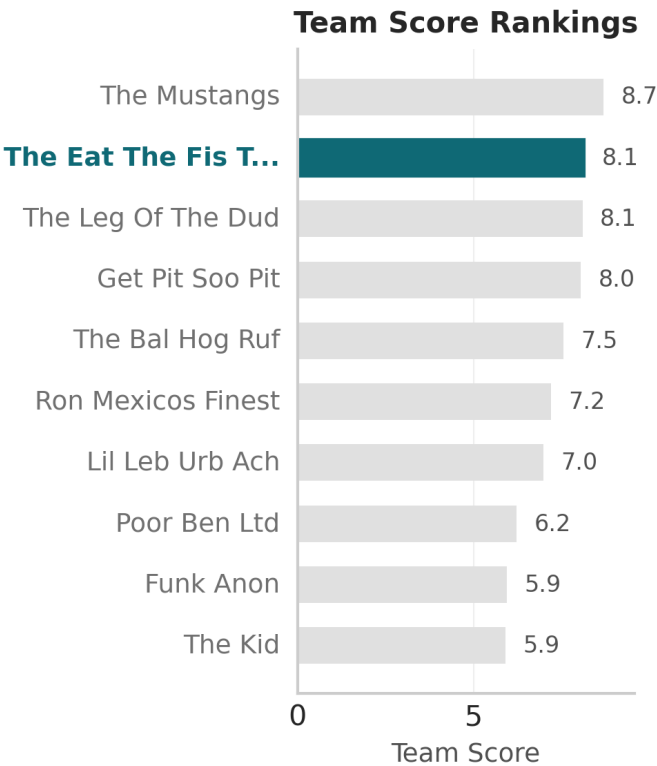

despite his slight edge in ADP at 2.01. Landing Johnson would address their running back depth with significant value, reflecting strategic foresight in capitalizing on draft dynamics. The decisions made in this draft could further solidify their status as a formidable contender in the league, enhancing an already robust roster with youthful potential and addressing critical positional needs. With their current-year draft capital, the team is well-positioned to make these impactful selections.

Ranked as the second-best team in the league, 'They're Eating The Fish, They're Eating The Bats' showcases a blend of youthful starters and strategic management that promises sustained competitiveness. The previous season's journey from mediocrity to contention highlighted their adaptability, particularly in overcoming injury challenges. With the youngest projected starters in the league, they have laid a solid foundation for long-term growth. Nevertheless, solid contributions from players like De'Von Achane and Rashod Bateman helped fill the gaps and maintain the team's competitive edge.

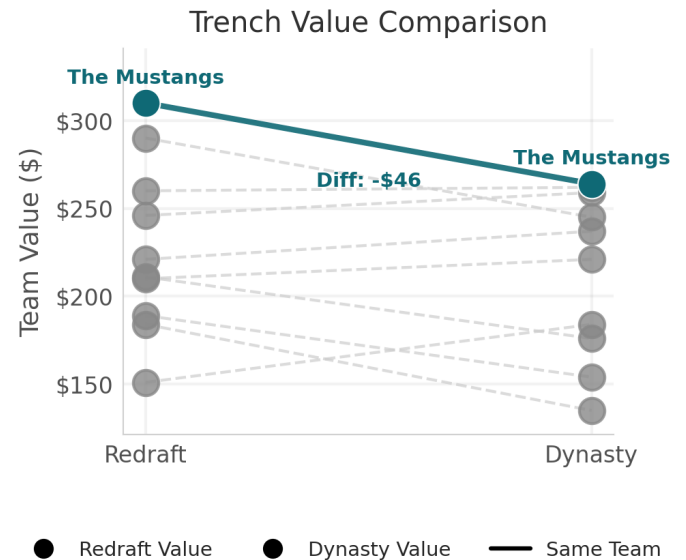

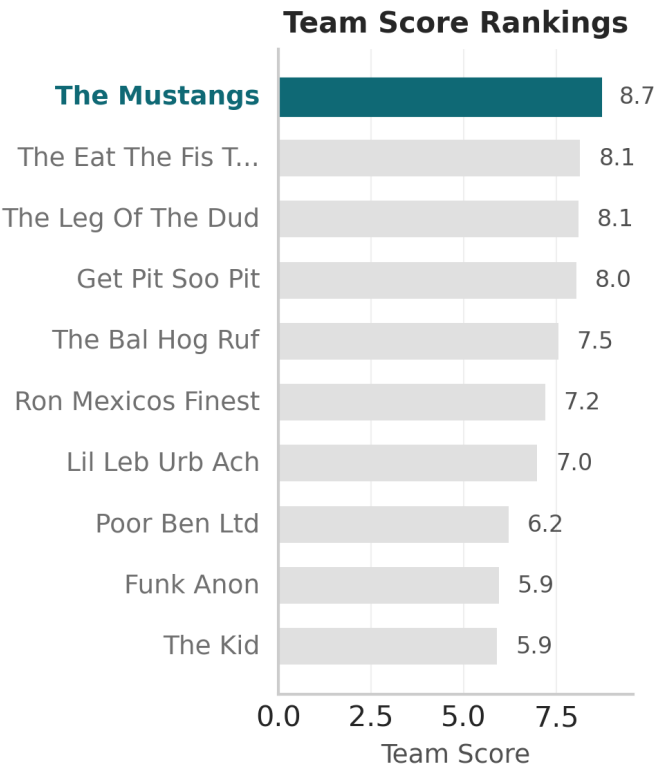
Another key area in which The Mustangs excel is at the tight end (TE) position, where George Kittle stands as the TE2 overall projection. Known for his
