The Shirley Temples had a forgettable season last year, stumbling to an abysmal 1-13 record. This wasn't exactly a surprise to the league, as it seems they've made a permanent home at the bottom of the standings. With a dreary 5-37 record over the past three seasons, the team has been more synonymous with the proverbial doormat rather than a competitive dynasty.

Despite the struggles, there was a glimmer of production from James Conner, who managed to finish as RB10. His efforts on the ground and in the passing game stood out as a rare high point, but unfortunately, he couldn't carry the entire team on his back. The lack of elite performances across the roster left the Shirley Temples gasping for any hint of a comeback.

In addition to a roster that already lacked star power, the team was plagued by injuries to key players. Both Adam Thielen and Dallas Goedert were hit with hamstring issues, limiting them to just ten games each. Their absences only compounded the team's woes, as Thielen's reliable hands and Goedert's potential in the tight end spot were sorely missed.

Overall, last season was yet another chapter in the saga of defeat for the Shirley Temples. It was a year where even their best efforts were met with little more than a sympathetic pat on the back and a 'better luck next time' card.


The Shirley Temples' outlook for the upcoming season does not inspire much confidence, as they are predicted to languish at the bottom of the league standings once more. With a redraft value ranking them dead last, it's clear that any hopes of a turnaround might be as likely as spotting a unicorn in the wild. Even their projected starters hold the unenviable position of being ranked twelfth, signaling another year of disappointment and dashed dreams.

A glaring weakness emerges at the quarterback position, which is especially damning in a superflex league where most teams aim to start multiple QBs. The team is saddled with Jaxson Dart, who is projected at QB30, leading a group that lacks a clear starter. Further down the list are Daniel Jones, Kenny Pickett, and Spencer Rattler, none of whom inspire confidence to lead the offense or rack up the fantasy points needed to compete with more formidable squads.

The running back situation isn't much better, with James Conner at RB19 being the team's only somewhat reliable option. Beyond him, Jaylen Warren at RB27 offers some hope, but the rest of the backfield with names like Kendre Miller, Will Shipley, and Phil Mafah barely moves the needle. Together, this motley crew makes the running back corps one of the weakest in the league, unable to strike fear into any opponent's heart.


Wide receivers offer little respite from the grim forecast, with George Pickens and Deebo Samuel leading a lackluster group. While Pickens is ranked WR33 and Samuel at WR43, their potential is overshadowed by the lack of depth, with contributions from Matthew Golden, Adam Thielen, Alec Pierce, and Luke McCaffrey doing little to change the narrative. Without the potential for breakout performances, the Shirley Temples' receiving unit remains solidly mediocre.

The Shirley Temples may find hope within their rookie class, which stands as one of their few strengths heading into the new season. Despite their last-place ranking, they managed to land Matthew Golden with the eighth overall pick. Although Golden was a bit of a reach compared to his average draft position, the team hopes he can bring an immediate impact as a projected starter at wide receiver. Meanwhile, Jaxson Dart's selection at pick 1.11 presents a glimmer of optimism; not only does he offer potential value falling slightly from his projected spot, but he also steps in as a much-needed projected starter at quarterback.

Further bolstering this promising rookie class, the Shirley Temples snagged Colston Loveland right at the start of the second round. Loveland, who projects as a starting tight end for the squad, provides a nice value as he fell just a bit past where most expected him to be drafted. While Phil Mafah's selection in the fourth round was somewhat ahead of his average draft projection, his addition to the roster adds depth to a running back group that desperately needs rejuvenation. Altogether, these newcomers provide a refreshing wave of potential talent for a franchise long starved of bright spots.



The quarterback position, arguably the most critical in a superflex league, is a glaring weakness for the Shirley Temples. Jaxson Dart leads the charge, but with a QB30 projection, he doesn't inspire the confidence needed to lead a successful fantasy team. Behind him, Daniel Jones and Kenny Pickett linger at QB35 and QB45, respectively, indicating a lack of depth and potential for consistent scoring. Spencer Rattler rounds out the group at QB47, bringing little more than a warm body to a position that desperately demands star power.

Running backs fare slightly better, albeit still far from championship-caliber. James Conner sits at RB19, offering a glimmer of reliability amidst a sea of uncertainty. However, the drop-off is sharp, with Jaylen Warren at RB27 being the only other back offering some semblance of hope. The rest of the group, consisting of Kendre Miller, Will Shipley, and Phil Mafah, barely registers on the fantasy radar, making it difficult for the Shirley Temples to challenge the league's more robust backfields.


Wide receiver, typically a backbone position for fantasy teams, is another area where the Shirley Temples falter. George Pickens and Deebo Samuel, holding ranks of WR33 and WR43, respectively, are the leaders of this underwhelming unit. Beyond them, the supporting cast featuring Matthew Golden, Adam Thielen, Alec Pierce, and Luke McCaffrey does little to elevate the team's prospects. Without significant breakout performances, this receiving corps is poised to remain mired in mediocrity, echoing the struggles seen across the rest of the roster.

The Shirley Temples' long-term roster outlook paints a picture as grim as their immediate prospects, sitting firmly at the bottom of the dynasty rankings. With no clear path to improvement, the team seems destined to remain entrenched in mediocrity for the foreseeable future, struggling to escape the basement of the league standings. The lack of high-value assets and limited trade capital only compounds the challenge of rebuilding a competitive roster.

The team's core players are aging and declining, further exacerbating their dynasty struggles. James Conner, once a reliable piece, is expected to drop to RB30, making him a diminishing asset rather than a foundational player for the future. Deebo Samuel, too, is on a downward trajectory, moving from WR43 to WR49, reflecting his dwindling impact and the team's inability to capitalize on his prime years.

Adding insult to injury, the Shirley Temples' tight end situation is equally uninspiring, with both Evan Engram and Dallas Goedert seeing their values plummet. Engram, dropping from TE7 to TE12, and Goedert, slipping from TE13 to TE16, highlight a positional group that lacks both depth and upside, further limiting the team's fantasy potential.

Despite these challenges, there are minor glimmers of hope within the youth on the roster. Matthew Golden and Colston Loveland show promising upward trends, with Golden's value rising from WR55 to WR36 and Loveland making notable strides from TE17 to TE6. However, these small victories do little to mask the overall bleakness of the Shirley Temples' dynasty outlook, which remains a cautionary tale of management missteps and unmet expectations.



Despite the glimmer of hope provided by a strong rookie class, the Shirley Temples face a challenging season ahead. Their projected lastplace finish is largely due to glaring weaknesses at key positions like quarterback, running back, and wide receiver, combined with a lack of depth. Past struggles, including a disappointing 1-13 record, exacerbated have been by injuries and underperformance across the board. The team's long-term prospects are equally concerning, with aging players and limited assets keeping them anchored at the bottom of dynasty rankings. Without significant improvement and strategic changes, the Shirley Temples seem destined to remain in the league's lower echelon for the foreseeable future.

The outlook for No Punt Intended this season is as bleak as a kicker's career in a no-punting league. Projected to be the second-worst team, they seem destined for the cellar, clinging to redraft value rankings for dear life at a dismal #11 out of 12. With starting projections that also scream #11, this team appears poised to struggle from the getgo.

At quarterback, it's less about a depth chart and more of a house of cards with Jordan Love leading

the charge at QB15. His supporting cast—featuring Shedeur Sanders, Tyler Shough, Will Levis, and Malik Willis—all rank outside the top 30, leaving much to be desired in this superflex league where multiple quarterbacks are usually key to success.

The running back room offers a glimmer of hope, ranked 7th amongst teams, with James Cook, David Montgomery, and Aaron Jones rounding out a serviceable trio. But even this group may not be enough to lift the team from its projected depths as depth concerns linger ominously behind them.

Wide receivers form the weakest link, securing the team's position as the league's worst in this category. With Michael Pittman leading the core at a paltry WR45, followed by a medley of mid-tier talent like Ricky Pearsall and Jalen McMillan, the receiving corps seems more likely to generate sympathy than fantasy points.

Tight ends don't fare much better. Tucker Kraft and Dalton Schultz, while perhaps serviceable, won't strike fear into opponent's hearts with their TE11 and TE24 statuses. This mediocre ranking reflects the broader struggles of a team seemingly built for anything but longevity.

Last year's campaign for No Punt Intended was a cocktail of mediocrity and misfortune, culminating in a 4-10 regular season record that epitomized their struggles. A team that once flirted with the middle of the pack, they now find themselves submerged in the depths of the standings, with only a 16-26 record over the past three seasons. This recent history of underperformance underscores a franchise grappling with both identity and consistency issues.

Despite fielding players with notable individual performances, the team as a whole couldn't translate those into wins. Jordan Love, while serviceable with 3,389 passing yards and 25 touchdowns, didn't quite emulate the quarterback savior role the team desperately needed. The ground game showed more promise, with Aaron Jones and James Cook combining for over 2,000 rushing yards and a plethora of touchdowns. However, even these valiant efforts on the ground were not enough to conjure magic on the scoreboard.

Injuries also played a hand in clipping the wings of No Punt Intended, particularly within the receiving corps. Ricky Pearsall's limited availability managing just 11 games—meant a shortage of reliable targets for Love, while the tight end Tucker Kraft offered a rare bright spot with 707 receiving yards and seven touchdowns. Alas, the individual flashes of brilliance did little to illuminate the dark cloud hanging over the team, as they stumbled through a season filled with more questions than answers.

The longterm roster outlook for 'No Punt Intended' appears grim, as the team is ranked a dismal #11 in dynasty leagues. The current composition lacks both short-term and long-term promise, with few players expected to make significant leaps in value. At quarterback, Jordan Love offers a glimmer of hope by moving up to QB12, but this slight improvement does little to alleviate concerns about the team's overall trajectory. The lack of depth and star power at quarterback highlights a critical area of need that has yet to be addressed.

In the running back department, James Cook shows potential with his rise to RB10, suggesting some degree of future promise. However, this optimism is tempered by Aaron Jones's significant drop to RB32, indicating a decline that marks the end of his prime years. Brian Robinson provides some stability by inching up to RB26, but the backfield is nonetheless fraught with uncertainty and lacks the explosive talent required to significantly alter the team's fortunes.

The wide receiver unit remains a glaring weakness, anchored by Michael Pittman, whose

marginal slide to WR46 underscores a broader trend of stagnation. While Ricky Pearsall climbing to WR41 injects a faint hint of excitement, the corps overall lacks dynamic playmakers capable of rejuvenating the offensive strategy. Furthermore, Romeo Doubs's descent to WR64 exemplifies the ongoing struggles within this group, contributing to the overall narrative of a receiving corps that fails to inspire confidence.

Tight end Tucker Kraft emerges as a rare bright spot, improving to TE10, which positions him as one of the few assets that may retain or increase in value over time. Yet, even this minor success story can't overshadow the broader issues plaguing the team. With the roster largely devoid of top-tier talent and future stars, 'No Punt Intended' faces an uphill battle not only this season but also for seasons to come, unless significant changes are made. This bleak dynasty outlook serves as a stark reminder of the pressing need for strategic roster overhauls and savvy player acquisitions.


No Punt Intended's rookie draft might just be the flickering candle in their otherwise dim roster outlook. They made savvy moves by selecting Tyler Shough a touch ahead of his ADP, which could pay off given their desperate need for depth at quarterback. The true highlight, however, was landing Shedeur Sanders as a projected starter in the third round. Securing him later than his ADP suggests, Sanders offers immediate value and injects some much-needed energy into the lineup.

Further down the draft board, the team pulled off a coup by snatching Elic Ayomanor well behind his expected ADP, offering a glimmer of hope that he could evolve into a reliable target. While their choice of Jacory Croskey-Merritt might appear a tad premature, it underscores their determination to bolster the running back ranks. Certainly, this rookie class signals the first signs of strategic thinking, but it's only the beginning for a franchise in dire need of a serious rebuild.

In a twist of irony befitting their team name, No Punt Intended finds themselves punting their hopes and dreams a few years down the line with an excess of draft capital. The team has managed to collect an impressive array of future picks, though only a solitary first-round pick graces their collection in 2026. This lone first-rounder might be the saving grace, or perhaps just another roll of the dice in the unpredictable realm of dynasty fantasy football.

With three second-round selections scheduled for next year's draft, No Punt Intended may yet unearth a diamond in the rough amid the usual array of cubic zirconia. These additional picks provide them a slight edge over rivals, offering the tantalizing possibility of striking gold with lesserknown talents. However, whether these selections will transform into future stars or merely contribute to the team's ongoing mediocrity remains as uncertain as their current lineup.

Looking further ahead to 2027, the team again holds a single first-round selection, a beacon of hope that seems to flicker dimly in the distance. While this draft capital surplus might not alter their immediate fate, it provides a faint glimmer of optimism that sustained, strategic drafting might eventually lift them from the basement of the league standings. Still, unless these picks translate into true difference-makers, No Punt Intended's future may remain as pun-worthy as its present.



'No Punt Intended' enters the upcoming season with significant challenges across key positions, as reflected in their #11 ranking, and a history of underwhelming performance that saw them struggle to a 4-10 record last year. While the roster currently lacks depth and immediate star power, there is a glimmer of optimism in their recent rookie draft selections, which could spark a future turnaround. Coupled with impressive draft capital, including key picks in future drafts, the team might find a path to long-term improvement if they can strategically leverage these assets. However, without substantial roster changes, they remain poised for a difficult season among the league's lower tier.

Club Vanderflexxx entered last season with the aspirations of rising above their historical mediocrity, but once again, they managed to deliver a performance that was painfully average. With an 8-6 record, they barely scraped above . 500, which appears to be the defining trait of this team over the years. Their record, a lackluster 25-17 over the past few seasons, suggests that the club is stuck in a perpetual cycle of almost being good enough but never quite making it.

This team's roster is led by Brock Purdy, who put up decent numbers with 3,864 passing yards and 20 touchdowns, but his performance wasn't enough to pull Club Vanderflexxx out of their rut. Similarly, Josh Jacobs showed his skills on the ground with 1,329 rushing yards and 15 touchdowns, yet even his efforts couldn't push the team beyond their average status. Alvin Kamara contributed with solid all-around stats, but like the rest of his team, he just couldn't elevate them to anything more than pedestrian.

Despite having some eye-catching performances from individual players like Jakobi Meyers, who gathered 87 receptions for 1,027 receiving yards, and Mike Evans, whose 11 touchdowns were impressive, Club Vanderflexxx still resembled a collection of stars rather than a cohesive constellation. Even with Jonnu Smith and Zach Ertz both contributing respectable receiving stats, the team simply couldn't gel into a formidable force. Pat Freiermuth's 653 receiving yards and seven touchdowns were not enough to break free from the clutches of mediocrity that seems to define this squad.

In the end, Club Vanderflexxx remains a masterclass in underachievement, producing just enough flashes of brilliance to frustrate their fans without delivering any tangible success. If there's one thing this team has proven, it's that consistency is key – though perhaps not the kind of consistency anyone would envy.

Entering the new season, Club Vanderflexxx seems poised to continue their tradition of mediocrity, grappling with a projected middle-of-the-pack finish. With a redraft value ranking of #8 out of 12, the team is clearly not setting the fantasy world on fire but remains stubbornly average, as always. Brock Purdy is expected to lead the charge from quarterback with a positional rank of QB12, while Justin Fields lurks at QB14, offering some potential for high-risk, high-reward performances. J.J. McCarthy and the aging Kirk Cousins round out the uninspiring quarterback roster, creating a position group that is the epitome of 'just good enough.'

In the backfield, Josh Jacobs stands tall as RB9, bringing a semblance of star power to a team desperately in need of it. Alvin Kamara adds support as RB15, though his best days might be behind him. Travis Etienne's presence at RB34 suggests depth that could be serviceable, but don't expect him to carry this team over the top. The remaining crew of TreVeyon Henderson, Justice Hill, and Alexander Mattison are there to fill in gaps rather than make any significant impact.

The wide receiver position is where things really start to look grim for Club Vanderflexxx. With Mike

Evans being the lone standout at WR17, the rest of the receiving corps falls off a cliff. Jakobi Meyers at WR40 and Darnell Mooney at WR49 try their best to anchor a group that features an alarming dropoff with players like Xavier Legette and DeAndre Hopkins languishing far below expectations. Kayshon Boutte and others offer little more than warm bodies, making the WR group one of the weakest in the league.

Tight end may be one of the few bright spots, with Jonnu Smith achieving a respectable TE6 ranking. However, the support from Pat Freiermuth and Zach Ertz at TE16 and TE20 respectively, suggests that while there is depth, none are likely to break out as true stars. In a superflex league where multiple quarterbacks are often the norm, Club Vanderflexxx will be relying heavily on its top players to just stay afloat. It's clear that contending this year will take a good bit of fortune and perhaps a miracle or two.

In the long-term, Club Vanderflexxx doesn't inspire much confidence, as they seem to be on a downward trajectory with several key players projected to decline in value over time. TreVeyon Henderson offers a rare glimmer of hope by rising from RB26 to RB16, potentially becoming a key contributor in the future. J.J. McCarthy also sees a slight increase in value, moving into QB18 territory, though this is hardly enough to hang the team's hopes on.

On the flip side, significant players like Mike Evans and Alvin Kamara are set for a nosedive in their dynasty outlook. Evans tumbles from WR17 to WR35, and Kamara slides from RB15 to RB23, signaling their days of peak performance are likely behind them. This decline is further exacerbated by Justin Fields moving from QB14 to QB24, indicating a worrying trend in their quarterback depth.

The tight end position isn't immune to these woes, with Jonnu Smith dropping from TE6 to TE15, and Pat Freiermuth moving down to TE20 territory, demonstrating that any semblance of stability in this section might be short-lived. As for the wide receiver group, Jakobi Meyers and Darnell Mooney both see reductions in value, further driving home how lackluster this unit is outside of Evans' fading star.

Overall, Club Vanderflexxx's long-term outlook seems to epitomize mediocrity, with aging stars losing their luster and younger assets insufficiently compensating for this decline. The team risks being stuck in fantasy purgatory unless significant changes are made, either through savvy trades or hitting a home run in the draft, to rejuvenate their roster.

In the rookie draft, Club Vanderflexxx managed to snag some players who could offer a glimmer of hope for their otherwise uninspiring roster. Leading the pack is TreVeyon Henderson, taken at 1.06, precisely matching his ADP, which suggests he could be a solid fit as a projected starter. As one of the few players likely to make an immediate impact, Henderson offers a beacon of potential in a team that desperately needs it. His ability to contribute right away might just be the spark that ignites a playoff push, or at the very least, lifts Club Vanderflexxx out of their perpetual mediocrity.

In the mid and late rounds, the team picked up TE Elijah Arroyo and WR Pat Bryant, who could become strategic assets depending on how they develop. Arroyo was selected slightly ahead of his ADP at 3.06, indicating a small reach but also a belief in his potential to outperform expectations. Meanwhile, Bryant, picked at 4.06, represents a value grab as he fell slightly below his ADP of 3.12, offering upside in a weak receiving corps. While neither may be immediate game-changers, their development could eventually provide the depth and future promise that Club Vanderflexxx so urgently needs.

Darnell Mooney - Marquee Player



Darnell Mooney finds himself in the uncomfortable spotlight as a projected starter for Club Vanderflexxx, a role that perhaps says more about the team's lack of depth than his individual prowess. As he approaches the 2025 season at age 29, Mooney's WR49 ranking offers little hope for a breakout year, leaving him as a symbol of the mediocrity that has come to define this team. His 2024 stats, including a middling 64 receptions for 992 yards and 5 touchdowns, underscore an average performance that neither thrills nor disappoints, but certainly doesn't suggest a path to elevating the team's fortunes.

Despite the underwhelming numbers, Mooney remains one of the few consistent options in an otherwise barren receiving corps, proving that sometimes being the best of the worst is enough to earn a starting spot on this roster. His 106 targets last season indicate a certain level of trust from his quarterback, though transforming those opportunities into game-changing plays remains elusive. With a mere 9.4 yards per reception, Mooney's inability to stretch the field or ignite the offense leaves Club Vanderflexxx perpetually searching for answers.

As the perennial symbol of 'just good enough,' Mooney's role in the upcoming season feels more like a placeholder than a position of strength. Unless he can defy expectations and rise above his projected output, Club Vanderflexxx is likely to remain trapped in the cycle of mediocrity, relying on Mooney to do what he does best: provide adequate, if uninspiring, performances week in and week out. In a world where potential barely meets necessity, Mooney becomes the reluctant face of a team desperately in need of a savior, yet seemingly unwilling to look beyond the usual suspects.



Club Vanderflexxx finds itself in the challenging position of needing to break free from mediocrity, ranking near the bottom in dynasty aspirations. record last season, Despite an 8-6 their performance on both short-term and long-term fronts lacks the spark necessary for a significant leap forward. The team's current roster projection suggests continued struggles due to a lack of star power and a weak wide receiver group. Although the recent draft class provides a glimmer of hope with players like TreVeyon Henderson, Elijah Arroyo, and Pat Bryant, the overall outlook remains bleak without a clear strategy for rejuvenation. Reflecting this ongoing struggle, Darnell Mooney's steady but unspectacular contributions symbolize the broader challenges Club Vanderflexxx faces in elevating its status in the league.

Last season was one for the books for all the wrong reasons, as 'Jameson's Distillery' spiraled into a 2-12 record, solidifying their position as one of the league's perennial underperformers. With a history that reads more like a tragedy than a tale of triumph, the team managed only a 9-33 record across the past three lackluster years, making last year just another chapter of disappointment for fans and owner alike.

Despite the overall gloom, there were glimmers of competence thanks to Kyren Williams and Jameson Williams, who defied the team's mediocrity by finishing as RB6 and WR13, respectively. This duo proved that even in a cellar-dwelling squad, individual brilliance can shine through the murk. Unfortunately, such performances were the exception rather than the rule, leaving the team floundering at the bottom of the standings.

The season's woes were compounded by injuries to key players such as Brandon Aiyuk and Rashee

Rice. A torn ACL for Aiyuk and an LCL injury for Rice meant fewer offensive weapons and unfulfilled potential. Even with notable statistics from players like Aaron Rodgers and Caleb Williams leading from the quarterback position, the rest of the team just couldn't pull together for a cohesive campaign.

Frankly, this season left fans wondering if 'Jameson's Distillery's' motto should be changed to 'Age Before Glory', with the focus on aging tactics rather than championship aspirations. It seems that for every step forward taken by standout performers, the team was only dragged further back by injuries and a glaring lack of depth.

As the new season dawns, 'Jameson's Distillery' finds itself with an outlook as foggy as a night in a Dublin pub. Projected to rank ninth overall, this team will need more than a shot of Irish luck to climb up the standings. With Caleb Williams QB13 leading the charge, alongside Trevor Lawrence QB19 and Aaron Rodgers QB32, the quarterback position may be their best bet for brewing some success in this superflex league. While not elite, these quarterbacks can guide the team to moments of glory if they play their cards right.

When it comes to running backs, the lineup is a mixed bag at best. Chuba Hubbard RB18 and Omarion Hampton RB22 form the backbone of the rushing attack, with Najee Harris RB32 offering depth. However, given the crowded backfield with names like Tank Bigsby RB40 and MarShawn Lloyd RB54, the team will need to sort out the pecking order quickly to avoid stumbling out of the gate. A mid-pack ranking at ninth shows that this group has potential but lacks a standout performer to truly carry the load.

The wide receiver corps offers a glimmer of hope, albeit lined with caveats. Rashee Rice WR20 is poised to be the top target, though he's got Jameson Williams WR32 and Brandon Aiyuk WR39 vying for attention. The rest of the receiving lineup, including Keon Coleman WR54 and Wan'Dale Robinson WR65, will need to step up and contribute consistently. If this unit can find chemistry and cohesion, they might just outperform their current projections, but that's a big 'if' given the history of injuries and underperformance.

While the team boasts varied talents across the board, the tight end position remains a glaring weak spot, with Taysom Hill TE31 leading a group that ranks dead last in the league. Though another section will dive into this issue, it's clear that without significant improvement or a miraculous breakout from one of their tight ends, 'Jameson's Distillery' will struggle to mix the perfect potion for a playoff run. In this league, having a strong foundation is essential, and the current setup seems more like a house of cards rather than a fortress ready for battle.

Looking ahead, 'lameson's Distillery' finds itself in a rather middling position in terms of long-term prospects. While there's potential for growth, especially from rising stars like Omarion Hampton, who is projected to leap from RB22 to an impressive RB7, the team overall lacks a true game-changer that could propel them into the upper echelons of the league. Caleb Williams and Lawrence offer some at Trevor stability quarterback with their projected improvements to QB9 and QB16 respectively, but it's yet to be seen consistently deliver they can top-tier if performances over the coming years.

The wide receiver group presents a mixed bag in terms of future value. Players like Brandon Aiyuk and Jameson Williams show promise with their increased rankings to WR32 and WR29, but whether they can shoulder the load as dependable dynasty assets remains uncertain. Rashee Rice also edges higher to WR18, suggesting he could be a cornerstone of this receiving corps if he continues his upward trajectory. Yet, this group will need to step up collectively if the team hopes to escape the bounds of mediocrity.

In the backfield, while there are incremental gains, the outlook is far from revolutionary. Chuba Hubbard slips slightly to RB19, and Najee Harris slides to RB33, indicating a backfield in slight decline. However, the rise of Omarion Hampton to RB7 injects a glimmer of hope, potentially setting him up as a future focal point of the offense. Meanwhile, Jaydon Blue offers marginal value improvement but may still struggle to secure a significant role.

Overall, the team's dynasty value holds steady, with only a modest increase of \$45 in total. This reflects a roster that is neither collapsing nor soaring but rather treading water amidst fluctuating player values. If 'Jameson's Distillery' hopes to achieve long-term success, strategic trades or savvy drafting may be needed to turn this mid-tier ensemble into a championshipcontending juggernaut.




Position Analysis QB

The tight end position at 'Jameson's Distillery' is, without exaggeration, a disaster zone - a vast, barren landscape of dashed hopes and unmet potential. Led by Taysom Hill TE31, who, let's face it, was more gadget player than true tight end even on his best day, this group offers as much excitement as a wet mop in a thunderstorm. Noah Fant TE32, once a beacon of hope for tight end enthusiasts, has settled comfortably into mediocrity, apparently content to hover around the fringes of fantasy relevance.

The addition of Theo Johnson TE37 adds another layer of uncertainty rather than stability. Despite whispers of untapped upside, he's yet to prove he can be more than just an afterthought in fantasy circles. In a TE Premium league where tight ends earn extra points for receptions, fielding this trio is akin to bringing a butter knife to a sword fight. Without a breakout miracle, Jameson's Distillery is poised to remain at the bottom of the barrel, frustrating fans hoping for even a hint of competence from this beleaguered unit.

When it comes to draft capital, 'Jameson's Distillery' holds a rather intriguing hand for 2026, boasting not one, not two, but three first-round picks. This treasure trove of selections provides the team with a golden ticket to potentially transform their lackluster roster into something resembling a competitive squad, or at least one that can feasibly pretend to be. It's as if the GM decided to channel their inner dragon and hoard these picks, waiting to unleash them on a class of unsuspecting rookies who might, if all goes well, elevate this team from the depths of despair.

However, this bounty of draft ammunition seems to dry up by 2027, where 'Jameson's Distillery' is left clutching a lonely first-round pick like a child holding onto a security blanket in a frightening world of NFL uncertainties. While they may have struck gold for 2026, it's almost as if they took a long, indulgent sip of optimism before sobering up to the reality of their future drafts. Unless they plan on spinning their wheel of fortune early in 2026, this fleeting windfall might evaporate faster than you can say 'rebuild.'



'Jameson's Distillery' faces a challenging season ahead, finding themselves in a below-average position overall due to a combination of previous underperformance and current roster weaknesses. Despite having a solid quarterback group, the team is plagued by uncertainty in both the RB and WR positions, and the tight end slot remains a considerable concern. While they hold promising draft capital for 2026 with three first-round picks, their long-term vision is less secure with only one pick in 2027. As they aim to break out of their cycle of middling performance, strategic utilization of their draft capital and addressing key positional weaknesses will be crucial for improving their standing in the league.

The Todds' 2022 campaign was a season to forget, finishing with a disappointing 4-10 record. This marked a significant decline for a team that had once been a powerhouse in the league. Despite their historical success, their performance over the past three years had already started showing signs of decline with a 23-19 record, and last season only exacerbated this downward trend. The lack of elite performances was evident throughout the year, contributing to their overall struggles. While the team managed to secure good production from key players like Patrick Mahomes, Jonathan Taylor, Ladd McConkey, Courtland Sutton, and Mark Andrews, it was not enough to elevate the team's overall performance. Mahomes, despite being a staple in the quarterback position, finished as QB12, a far cry from his usual elite ranks. Similarly, Jonathan Taylor delivered a strong performance with 1,431 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns but it wasn't enough to carry the team to success.

In the receiving corps, Ladd McConkey and Courtland Sutton both put up respectable WR11 and numbers. finishina as WR10 respectively, yet their efforts were overshadowed by the team's overall lack of depth and consistency. Calvin Ridley also contributed with over 1,000 receiving yards, but his impact was limited with only four touchdowns. Meanwhile, Mark Andrews proved to be a reliable target at tight end with 11 touchdowns, but even his commendable performance couldn't offset the team's shortcomings elsewhere.

Ultimately, the Todds' inability to generate elite performances across the board led to their underwhelming season. While they have pieces that can contribute, the lack of cohesion and standout performances resulted in their fall from grace.

Despite last season's struggles, 'The Todds' have amassed an impressive stockpile of draft assets that sets them up for a potential rebound. With an additional first-round pick and three second-round picks in the upcoming draft, this team is uniquely positioned to inject fresh talent into their roster. Such a surplus of picks provides a strategic advantage, allowing them to potentially trade up for elite prospects or address multiple areas of need simultaneously.

Looking beyond next year, the Todds also boast a healthy warchest of 2026 draft capital. This longterm planning reflects a savvy approach to building a competitive team foundation, paving the way for sustained success down the line. However, their future outlook isn't entirely rosy; they hold just one first-round selection in 2027, which might limit their long-term flexibility if they can't capitalize on their current assets.

While the immediate influx of picks in the next draft cycle offers hope for a turnaround, the pressure is on management to make the right choices. It's a delicate balance between leveraging immediate draft capital to improve now, while also safeguarding against potential pitfalls in the seasons to come. The Todds are facing an uphill battle this season, projected to be near the bottom of the league standings with a redraft value ranking of #10 out of 12. Their starting lineup also mirrors this lack of strength, pegged at the same lowly rank. This grim outlook is primarily driven by significant weaknesses across key positions, most notably in their quarterback and running back groups.


In the quarterback department, the team faces considerable challenges, especially in a superflex league format that heavily emphasizes the importance of strong QB play. With Drake Maye leading the charge as QB18, followed by Michael Penix Jr. (QB24), Anthony Richardson (QB25), and Jalen Milroe (QB33), the Todds lack the elite signalcaller needed to consistently compete at a high level. This lack of top-tier talent could severely cap their scoring potential and flexibility in lineups.

The running back situation is equally concerning, as the Todds hold one of the weakest RB units in the league. Rhamondre Stevenson leads the group as RB35, with Jordan Mason (RB42) filling in as the next best option. Beyond these two, the depth is worrisome, with Devin Neal (RB61), DJ Giddens (RB71), and others struggling to project any significant fantasy impact. This positional frailty will make it challenging to secure consistent points week-to-week.

Further compounding their struggles is the tight end group, which ranks near the bottom at TE11. Mike Gesicki is the team's projected starter at TE22, a glaring issue that could lead to mismatches against teams with stronger options at the position. Without a reliable and impactful tight end, the Todds may find it difficult to keep pace with higher-scoring opponents.


Overall, the Todds are expected to face numerous hurdles this season, with weak performances anticipated across multiple positions.

With the influx of fresh talent from the rookie draft, 'The Todds' have managed to assemble one of the stronger classes this year, which is a crucial step in addressing their roster's shortcomings. Their first pick, wide receiver Travis Hunter, was selected at 1.03—two spots ahead of his average draft position (ADP). While this aggressive move demonstrates confidence in Hunter's potential impact, it also introduces an element of risk that could either pay off handsomely or backfire. On the plus side, securing Devin Neal at 3.08 as a projected starter aligns perfectly with his ADP, providing stability and immediate contribution without reaching.


The decision to draft quarterback Jalen Milroe at 2.09, slightly below his ADP of 2.07, highlights a strategic value play that strengthens their shaky QB lineup. The remainder of their draft focused on acquiring depth, with running backs DJ Giddens and Jordan James and tight end Gunnar Helm being brought in slightly ahead of their ADPs. While these selections may raise eyebrows as minor reaches, they reflect a calculated approach in bolstering weak positions. Isaac TeSlaa, picked at 4.1, also comes in earlier than expected, showing the management's proactive stance in shoring up the receiving corps. Despite some questionable picks, this class provides much-needed hope for rejuvenating their roster.



The Todds' longterm roster outlook is fraught with challenges, as the team's current composition lacks the depth and high-end talent necessary for sustained success. The team's dynasty ranking of #10 out of 12 underscores this concern, highlighting a roster that needs significant improvement to remain competitive over the coming years. The lack of elite players across key positions restricts their potential to climb the league standings and indicates ongoing struggles without substantial roster enhancements.

A closer examination of the Todds' roster reveals few bright spots in terms of dynasty value and growth potential. While Travis Hunter stands out with a noteworthy rise from WR34 to WR16, reflecting his potential to be a cornerstone player in the future, other areas of the roster offer little optimism. Drake Maye's projected improvement from QB18 to QB10 offers a glimmer of hope in the quarterback room, but it remains insufficient as a singular highlight amidst a pool of mediocrity.

Unfortunately, the team faces more value decline than gain, with players like Khalil Shakir and Chris Olave seeing drops in their projected rankings, indicating waning confidence in their long-term contributions. Similarly, Jordan Mason's slide from RB42 to RB44 further deepens the concerns in the running back department. These declines suggest that the team's core may erode faster than it can be rebuilt unless proactive measures are taken. Overall, the Todds' roster lacks a coherent foundation of young, rising stars necessary to secure a prosperous future. Without impactful trades or successful drafts, the path ahead appears bleak, marked by missed opportunities to capitalize on existing assets. The team's management faces a critical juncture where decisive, strategic moves will be paramount to prevent a prolonged downturn in performance. Despite a challenging season with a 4-10 record, The Todds sit at the middle of the league rankings due to their strong draft capital and impressive rookie class. However, significant roster weaknesses, particularly at quarterback, running back, and tight end, hinder their competitiveness in the short term. While the infusion of new talent offers hope, the team's long-term outlook remains uncertain as they navigate declines in player values and the absence of elite talent.

Last season was a year of both triumph and tribulation for The Traders. They secured a remarkable 9-5 record, showcasing a level of success that had eluded them in recent years. This performance was a departure from their historical trend of average standings, with the team compiling a solid 24-18 record over the past few years. However, the team also faced significant adversity with injuries to pivotal players such as Russell Wilson, Isiah Pacheco, Cooper Kupp, and David Njoku. These setbacks limited their on-field options, impacting their consistency throughout the season. Wilson and Pacheco missed substantial time, playing only 11 and 7 games respectively, while Kupp and Njoku's injuries further strained the team's depth.

Despite these challenges, the season's high points provided a glimpse of the team's potential when firing on all cylinders. Their ability to field competitive performances amid adversity speaks to their resilience and strategic acumen, setting a foundation for future growth.

The Traders navigated the rookie draft with a strategy that balanced immediate contributions and potential upside, though not without its missteps. Their first-round selection of WR Emeka Egbuka at 1.1 was a serendipitous value, as he fell slightly to their pick, presenting an opportunity to inject youthful talent into their receiving corps. This acquisition aligns well with their existing strong receiver lineup, reinforcing their offensive arsenal. The addition of TE Terrance Ferguson in the third round, picked slightly ahead of his ADP, indicates a calculated move to bolster depth at the tight end position, although it may not have been a necessity given their current roster stability.

However, the selection of QB Dillon Gabriel at 3.1 raises some eyebrows due to the reach nature of the pick, as his ADP suggested a selection much later. This choice appears to be a speculative gamble on untapped potential rather than an immediate need, considering the team's solid quarterback situation with Mayfield and Goff already leading the charge. While the draft provided a valuable piece in Egbuka, the overall impact is tempered by these strategic gambles, leaving The Traders with an average rookie class that does little to decisively enhance their competitive standing.

The Traders enter the current season with a roster that suggests a middle-of-the-pack performance, contingent on several pivotal factors. At the quarterback position, they are relatively strong, led by Baker Mayfield and Jared Goff who are projected at QB6 and QB10, respectively. This solid quarterback duo provides a stable foundation, though further depth in Russell Wilson and rookie Dillon Gabriel, despite their lower rankings, could offer unexpected contributions if given the opportunity. As such, the quarterback situation remains one of the team's more reliable aspects.

Running back remains a point of concern for The Traders, sitting at an eighth-place positional ranking among their league peers. Chase Brown leads the running back corps as RB10, but the depth guickly thins with Isiah Pacheco at RB24 and Zach Charbonnet at RB37. Charbonnet's role is particularly crucial, as his performance could be difference between the mediocrity and competitiveness given his projection as a starter. The rest of the running back group, including Rachaad White and Miles Sanders, will need to elevate their play to push the team into a more competitive stance.

Wide receiver, traditionally a strong point for The Traders, shows depth yet again with Drake London and Jaxon Smith-Njigba projected as WR9 and WR12 respectively. These two will be the primary offensive weapons, with Xavier Worthy and Cooper Kupp providing additional support. The hope for a breakout from Emeka Egbuka or Quentin Johnston looms large, as increased production from them could propel The Traders' receiving unit into the upper echelon. This roster flexibility allows for offensive creativity and depth in the passing game.

Tight end continues to be a modest position for The Traders, with David Njoku at TE9 being the standout. While not the strongest position on the roster, the team has reasonable depth with Ja'Tavion Sanders and Noah Gray offering backup options. The position may not be able to carry the team, but it should provide enough consistency for a balanced offensive approach.

Overall, The Traders' current year outlook is firmly average, but strategic lineup decisions and potential player breakouts could elevate their standing.

The Traders find themselves in a precarious position with respect to future draft capital. Next

year's rookie draft sees them without a first-round pick, which significantly limits their ability to acquire top-tier talent that could make an immediate impact. This deficit in early draft selections places the team at a disadvantage compared to other league members who may strengthen their rosters with high-value rookies. Without the luxury of leveraging first-round picks for potential trades or roster upgrades, The Traders will need to rely on later rounds and strategic decisions to fill gaps and ensure competitive sustainability.

Compounding their draft capital woes is the overall dearth of selections across upcoming drafts. This scenario pressures the team's management to maximize existing assets and identify under-theradar talent through trades or free agency. However, there is a silver lining as The Traders possess a first-round pick in 2027, providing a distant but critical opportunity to rejuvenate their roster with a premium selection. Until then, they will need to exercise patience and resourcefulness, navigating the challenges of limited draft capital while maintaining competitiveness in a league that demands constant evolution.


In the long term, The Traders' roster outlook remains firmly average, with a mix of aging veterans and emerging young talents shaping their future prospects. At quarterback, Baker Mayfield and Jared Goff provide stability, though both are projected to decline in value over time as they shift from QB6 and QB10 to QB15 and QB17 respectively. The presence of Russell Wilson offers some depth, but his injury history and declining performance limit his long-term potential. The speculative addition of rookie Dillon Gabriel could inject some new life into the position if he develops as hoped.

Running back is an area where The Traders face more significant challenges, as their leading back, Chase Brown, is projected to slip from RB10 to RB12. The wide receiver corps shows more promise, with Drake London and Jaxon Smith-Njigba anchoring the group as reliable top options. The anticipated rise of Emeka Egbuka and Xavier Worthy provides optimism, as both players are expected to gain value, potentially transforming the receiving unit into a formidable force. However, Cooper Kupp's decline from WR46 to WR57 highlights the challenge of balancing veteran experience with youth.

At tight end, David Njoku remains a consistent presence, but the position does not project as a significant advantage for The Traders moving forward. Ja'Tavion Sanders and Noah Gray offer serviceable depth, yet neither player is poised for a breakout that would elevate the team's overall performance. The lack of standout talent at tight end underscores the need for strategic acquisitions in the future to enhance this area.

Overall, the long-term roster outlook for The Traders is one of cautious optimism tempered by notable challenges. While they possess some promising young assets, managing the transition from aging stars to emerging contributors will be crucial in determining their trajectory within the league.



The Traders stand at a pivotal point, blending past success with uncertainty about the future. A commendable record last year fueled by strong performances sets a positive tone, but injuries and playoff hurdles revealed vulnerabilities. While their rookie class yielded both promising talent and questionable moves, their current roster's potential to achieve more than expected relies heavily on consistent guarterback output and surprise breakouts. The challenge lies in navigating a future with constrained draft options, having traded away near-term picks for longerterm gains. This strategic decision positions them in the middle tier, with opportunities to rise hinging on unlocking the full potential of their players and capitalizing on future draft assets.
